The technology explorations 10 class completed modules related to plumbing, electrical and carpentry. This class is offered within the regular timetable (1 block per day) and gives students who have an interest in trades a place to try out several trades paths. Students frame a floor and two walls with a space for a window and door. They then rough in some wiring and plumbing. Discussion in the class revolve around career choices (trades or other), which challenges students to begin thinking about their life after secondary school.



TASK offers students a chance to try several trades throughout the semester. It's a full-time half year program. One of the popular units is the pipe trades course led by Camosun instructors. This semester's students have recently finished the unit and had a chance to learn how to use various types of pipes used for plumbing. Here's the class practicing with red PEX pipe, likely the same pipe carrying water within the walls of your house. The second picture shows Kevin with a sneaky pose in front of Matt and Mitch's project. Matt and Mitch have just finished an exercise bending and joining copper pipe.

The engineering class spent much of the Octa learning to use Autocad and Inventor design software. By overlaying a 3d model over a 2d model and exporting it to a Cam program, students were able to use the cnc machine to cut out complex and accurate shapes. In this Octa they were challenged to copy a bike crankset. Several students managed to cut the pieces out of mdf (a wood product), a material substitute for the aluminum a crank would typically be made from. It is less expensive and easier on the machines tooling, but still goes through the exact same process needed to make a crankset out of metal.

Students and staff at RBSS were lucky to witness the gifting of blankets to two of our amazing Grade 12 students on Wednesday morning. As I am sure that you are aware, our school has had a very interesting week. Almost two weeks ago our new crosswalk was vandalized. This event has impacted the whole community. Instead of highlighting prejudice and fear, it has proven to be a powerful catalyst for contemplation, healing and positive change. Our entire school has benefited from the good learning that has emerged as a result of deep conversations. Two of our students, Oskar Wood and Cheyenne Norman are two student leaders who made major contributions to the creation and repair of the crosswalk, while at the same time facilitated positive conversations in our school and community at large.

On Wednesday, both Cheyenne and Oskar were recognized by Chief Russell Chipps from Beecher Bay with the presentation of a blanket. The blanket is part of the healing process and will act as an agent of protection and healing for those being honoured by such a gift. Blanketing is to honour someone's good work and achievements. It's also meant to represent being hugged, loved, protected by the community. The blanketing today was to recognize Oskar and Cheyenne's hard work, but also to hold them up in the difficult times. It serves as a reminder that we (the school, community) are there to care for and protect our students. Both Cheyenne and Oskar, as well as the school community, were deeply affected by the vandalism that occurred at our school two weeks ago, but both have emerged as strong leaders and strong voices for change and acceptance. The blankets are meant to help them along their journey knowing that our communities care for them.

Chief Russ Chipps, our Elder in Residence, Brother Rick and Bryan Johnson, District Principal of Aboriginal Education, presented both Oskar and Cheyenne with beautiful blankets and gifted the entire school with a beautiful song and drumming. It was amazing to witness the positive effect this had on the students and staff at RBSS. Throughout the ceremony we noticed the balconies and walkways throughout the school quietly filling up with students who were drawn in by the song and drum. These events are important to a school and have been sorely missed this year.

Thanks to Chief Chipps and Brother Rick, who took it upon themselves to recognize both Cheyenne and Oskar for all their hard work on behalf of the school and our community. Congratulations to Oskar and Cheyenne for helping to create such a powerful moment of deep learning for our school. It was a great event to witness and be part of.
