

Royal Bay Shop Classes - Technology Education

Try a Trade- Grade 7 Exploration

In early May Royal Bay hosted the entire grade 7 population from Dunsmuir Middle School in the shop spaces. Students rotated through four trades focussed areas including metal/welding, wood/joinery, electronics/electrical, and construction. The students built a wood base for a candle holder in the woodshop, and then deburred and welded around the periphery of a piece of pipe. The pipe was fit in the centre of the wood base; it's appearance like a melted candle. In the construction area students made a porcupine by nailing and screwing several pieces of wood together, modelling the spines, body, feet, head, and eyes using basic construction methods. In the electrical area students breadboarded a small circuit, programmed a microcontroller to output a custom light show, and practiced soldering components into a printed circuit board. What really stood out was how Royal Bay students from all grade levels stepped up to make this event a success. They volunteered their time and expertise; sharing what they know and inspiring younger students to possibly follow them into the shop spaces at Royal Bay.

Grade 9 and 10 Woodworking

The grade 9 and 10 woodworking classes at Royal Bay have also been busy building a selection of projects that are new this year:

Grade 9- Couch Butler

Students go through the Stock Break Out procedure learning new techniques throughout the project. Students use the mitre saw, jointer, thickness planer, table saw, and drill press. They learn proper glue up methods for assembly and construction to make the project last. This project is an excellent addition to your living room or as a side table next to your bed.

Grade 10- Side table

Students use their past knowledge of hand cut joinery plus the addition of using machinery to accomplish similar joinery. Students hand cut an edge cross-lap and cross lap joint for the table supports. For machine joinery, students cut the rabbet, mortise, and tenon on each table leg and cross supports. Creating the shelf and top uses a combination of techniques to accomplish either a round or square look depending on the student's choice.

3-piece puzzle

This project is an extra. While students are waiting in line to use a machine, or they have just glued up their tabletop and can't do anything until its dried, we add an extra project. This project can be done at any time throughout the term and uses different techniques and machines than their main project to add more variety, skill, and confidence in the woodshop.


